SUGGESTED PRESS STATEMENT ON SENATE BILL.

The Black Sash, while appreciating that a reform of the present packed Senate is highly necessary, places on record its disapproval of both the form and the spirit of the changes as set forth in the present Bill.

The Bill provides no representation at all for Africans and Asians who are more than 70 per cent of the population and wholly inadequate representation for Coloured people, whose one representative will be a White Senator, appointed by the Government. It offers no protection for racial minorities, and does not provide a genuine second chamber for revising legislation, because it gives an exaggerated majority to the party in power, and there are no safeguards against its once more being used, as in the Senate Act of 1955, in the interests, not of the country as a whole, but of a political party or of a privileged section.

The Black Sash was called into being on a wave of spontaneous anger and protest against a violation of the existing constitution, when the Senate was used for the purpose of depriving a section of the people of South Africa of their rights. It cannot approve of a Senate Bill which does not ensure that the rights of all sections of the community will be recognised and safeguarded.
