The Black Sash is proposing to hold a lunch-hour protest meeting in the Drill Hall on the Bantu Laws Amendment Bill during the Third Reading of the Bill.

We are anxious that the meeting should be as representative as possible of all those who believe it to be an unjust and unwise piece of legislation and we should, therefore, be extremely glad if your Organisation would care to send a representative who would sit on the platform.

We plan to have eminent people who will criticise the Bill both from a humanitarian and an economic point of view. Also to have an African who will explain how Africans feel about this legislation.
