The Rogional Conference was closely followed by the National Conference and at our 1.11 Branches Meeting on Novonber 9th, Mrs. Stoy and Mrs. Le. Feuvro gave a most excellent review of the Conference, to which they were delegates, togethor with Mesdames Robb, Roberts, Ferris, Conroy and Solomon. This reviow was greetly appreciated by nomburs.

We were most fortunate too, in having Mirs. Stott to tell us of hor intorview with Mr. De Wot Nol - we aro most fortmate in having Mirs. Stott! She must havo nade a groat inpact on the Ministor, as sho doos on all. who neot hor, to judge from tho longth of the intcrviow, which was to bo only half-an-hour, and actuelly lested nearly two hours! Thank you Mrs. Stott.

There was grect activity in the Peninsula during the first weeks of November, as this marked the beginning of the distribution of Reference Books for African Women by the authorities. Mrs. Duncen was in charge of the stands arranged to protest against this distribution and members stood at Rondebosch and at Athlone. There wore no incidents and stands wore quiot; membors carriod postors which read, "Ne doploro the break-up of lfrican home life."

On Saturday 14th Novembor, from 11.30 to 12, Mrs. Duneen was again rosponsible for a very good stand in idderley Street, (also against Reforence Dooks.) This was folt to be a good tine and dey to hold a stend, as it wes seon by many mombers of the public.

On Sundey, 15th Noveabor, a protost meoting callod by C.i. T.A.P.L.W. was hold in the Benqueting Holl of the City Hell. Thore were about 100 poople prosont. Mrs. Stott was in the chair. Advocrate de Villiers explained the Pass Laws and Mirs. Silinga of the iffican National Congress Women's League ploaded for bottor undorstanding betwoen Whites and non-Whitos. The meeting was quiot but not as woll attondod as it might have boon and the Region foels that in futuro neotings should not bo arranged for Sundays if possible.

4 stand protosting apoinst the banishmont of Mrs ilafchong was organiscd by tho Paarl and Wollington Branches in Paarl and 40 membors who came from Wollington, Stollonbosch, Blgin and Somorset Wost took part. Congratulations to those who organised this stand and all who cano so for to tako part. But Wollington (with those who holp in Paerl) is a most anazing branch and we aro not surprisod any more whon we hoor of its achiovements. It scoms thet nothing is too difficult for it to tackle and nothing doters it frou its purposc. Thoy have now beon rofused permission to enter the local location, which is doplorablo in viow of the enormous amount of goodwill thoir work has ongenderod amon st the pooplo therc. In tho Cape Tinos of Decomber 29th, we sco thore is a lottor from lirs. Strubon of Wollington Branch who foels that tho local Sash Brench did much to kecp the poace in tho location, willst thoy wore allowod to work thoro. Wo hope they will find somo wey of gotting round the rustrictions that havo boon pleced on thon.

The Lrchbishop's Conforence was recallod on Saturday 28th Novombor and Mrs. Stoy and Mirs. van Selia attended on our behalf. Mrs. Olivor was again responsiblo for arranging the teas thank you lirs. Olivor and all your helpors. Mirs. Stoy reported to 411 Branchos on the Conforonco. She had boen. most encouragod and thrilled by the work done by the various sub-comnittoos which had been asked to meke investigations into a) poverty b) civil disabilitios c) a now Constitution for South Lfrice and d) Union Day 1960.
