## RESEARCH PANEL

That $80 \%$ of South Africans have no voice in Parliament
other posters read:-
Apartheid is unjwot
Let beaches be open to all
Innocent or guilty the courts must decide
"Do not try to take a man's home from him" (Prime Minister, Windhoek 29.8.67)
Settled communities destroyed
Race Classification destroys homos, families, lives.
Those posters appeared in Afrikaans also.

When Parliament opened we inserted a quarter page advertisement in the Cape Times reminding the public that $80 \%$ of South Africans have no voice in Parliament. We listed major deprivations which have occurred during the twenty-four years of Nationalist government. We asked when Parliament would restore human dignity.

At the end of March a member of the Sash financed personally an insertion in the Cape Argus which pointed out that thousands of people in South Africa lived below the breadline and yet costs of food and transport continued to rise. Our punch line was "Pay better wages - or press for them". Unfortunately this advertisement was put in a very bad position and the vital words "inserted by the Black Sash" were omitted.
